**DEAR PARENTS AND GUARDIANS** 

WE HAVE JUST COMPLETED A FANTASTIC YEAR WITH HIGHLIGHTS INCLUDING THE EXTREMELY POSITIVE ERO REPORT THAT WE RECEIVED IN FEBRUARY AND THE SUPERB FEEDBACK THAT WE GOT FROM THE ST PAUL'S FAMILIES FROM THE TRI-ANNUAL COMMUNITY SURVEY THAT WAS UNDERTAKEN IN TERM THREE.

2017 has been one of the best for our sporting codes: with our Open A Netball, Clay-target Shooting and mixed Tennis sides all rated in the top ten teams in the country, while podium finishes were achieved by our girls' U18 eight, who were ranked third; boys' Squash team who once again were runners-up in the NZSS Champs and our national champions, our girls' U18 coxed four, who won the prestigious Dawn Cup at the Maadi regatta.

An impressive fourteen of our sports people gained selection for elite NZSS age group sides, ranging from traditionally high performing New Zealand codes such as Rowing, Rugby, Cricket and Squash, to sports such as Rafting, In-line Hockey, Rodeo and BMX.

On the stage, this year's demanding musical, 'Jekyll and Hyde' proved a resounding success, with just under 20% of the school roll involved either on or off the stage. With 42 musical numbers, the cast delivered their lines and songs in a consistently impressive manner. The 38 strong 'El Choro' group made a real resurgence, performing outstandingly well at the regional Big Sing and at quite a number of public performances,

while we also had a Pacifica group for the first time, our Kapa Haka struck out strongly on their own; we had students who were place-getters at regional and national speech contests and two of our musicians achieved national recognition in their selection for the NZSS and National Youth Orchestra.

Academically, we enjoyed some of our best ever success. Thirty-nine subject Scholarships was our third best result. While our graduating cohort gained an impressive 93% pass rate in NCEA Level 3 and 79% gained the more demanding tertiary entry qualification (29% above the rate typically gained by their peers nationally). While at the other end of the qualification scale, our Year 11 students achieved a record level of certificate endorsements, with 67% gaining a merit or excellence endorsement, compared to our previous best of 63% in 2015.

We have farewelled a number of icons in the St Paul's community with the departure of Mr Gary Judkins after 20 years of dedicated service to Mathematics and Chess; Mr Ian Parsons, our enthusiastic Big Band Director of eight years and Reverend James



Stephenson, our Chaplain, whose 2.5 years tenure does not do justice to the huge influence that he had on the hearts and minds of our students.

Our Year 13 Construction class, along with a team of builders from the St Paul's community completed a four-bedroom house for our Harington boarders to live in and upgraded the bathrooms in the Old Collegians' Pavilion. While we also, as a school, have added seven new single bedrooms to the Harington boarding accommodation; completed construction of the new Music facility and are well underway in the expansion of Clark House. Next year will see the new Drama and Dance Performance Centre, the Football and Hockey Pavilion and two new Tihoi classrooms finished.

For me, the ERO visit was a huge collective highlight, with the team



highlighting that our teaching team 'had established and maintained a culture of high expectations ... there was strong collaboration between staff ... they offered many opportunities for students to revisit learning ... our teachers were viewed as having a strong subject knowledge and depth of experience ... with many contributing at a regional or national level ... impressively staff establish positive learning partnerships with students and that there are ... strong positive relationships within our school – supported by strong involvement of teachers in cocurricular activities ... staff are open to professional development and improvement.' We should be collectively proud of such incredibly positive and

excellent feedback from this respected independent, national school audit agency. In their commentary on the Waikato Anglican College Trust Board, they stated that the school had 'very effective' governance ... Trustees are well informed ... use information well for strategic and innovative resourcing decisions and have good communication with our community.

The successes of the year came as a direct result of a great team effort. A combination of excellent governance, management, teaching and support from our wider community.


As parents, we thank you for the tremendous sacrifices that you have






# COMMUNITY SURVEY FEEDBACK – CITIZENSHIP SECTION

In the November Informer, we reported back on the feedback on Special Character from the just over 250 families who completed the Community Survey at the start of Term Three. In this issue, we want to focus on the feedback provided on the Citizenship questions:


























Pleasingly, 73.71% of parents rated the School a 5/6 or 6/6 for that it 'challenges students to do their best in all aspects of their education'; 79.40% gave it the same rating for the statement, 'The School provides a safe and supportive overall learning environment' (up 3% on 2014); 71.56% felt strongly that 'The School provides a fair and consistent discipline system' (up 7.5% on 2014); 67.96% believe strongly that 'The School encourages students to respect one another'. The weakest response was that 53.88% felt strongly that 'The School provides opportunity for multi-cultural awareness for

my child', despite the recently introduced student "Over the Fence Ministry" project, involving regular visits to low decile local primary schools and the establishment of our Polynesian Group in 2017. 69.70% felt strongly that 'The School handles student safety issues effectively', while 58.22% felt strongly that 'The School fosters positive interactions between girls and boys'. 75.22% felt strongly that 'The House system is a pivotal part of the pastoral care system' and a huge, 84.61% felt strongly that 'A programme of consciously raising awareness of Emotional Intelligence is important for all students'.



# RESIGNATION OF ICONIC HEAD OF MATHEMATICS – MR GARY JUDKINS



Gary Judkins joined St Paul's Collegiate in 1998 from Forest View High School where he had been Acting HOD of Mathematics, having started his teaching a little later in life, after working in the fur trade for 12 years in his beloved state of Montana.

When he was initially employed at St Paul's, he started as the Assistant Head of Mathematics, had a stint as the Deputy Housemaster of School House, before his appointment as the Head of the Mathematics department in 2006.

In his twenty years of outstanding service to our school, Gary has shown the importance in order to ensure student engagement, of having teachers of unique character and personality on the staff of a school. Gary is certainly a person who could be categorised in this manner; his strong American accent; his sense of humour and ready smile; his passion and almost obsession for Chess have endeared him to students and staff alike. In how many New Zealand classrooms do you enter to find prehistoric fossils (and they aren't the humans), toddler size Chess pieces, Chess sets of all different shapes and forms and Chess equipment completely surrounding the surfaces on all corners of the room. In some respects, the desks could have been viewed as an optional extra to the core function of

the room – the school headquarters of one of the world's most mentally challenging games (or should that be sports?).

It is not surprising then that through Gary's mentorship and guidance, St Paul's Chess teams over the past two decades have regularly defeated their nemesis, Hamilton Boys' High School, to make the NZSS national finals and to earn a consistent place as one of the top Chess schools in the country.

However, it has been in the classroom where Gary Judkins has excelled. He brought that same passion and enthusiasm for Chess, into his Mathematics classroom. He has consistently been one of those teachers who students wanted to be in his class. They knew Gary had a genuine interest in them and their academic success; was prepared to go the extra mile if they got stuck; would always present at the front of the room with a happy, cheerful and positive demeanour. He is very much a reflective practitioner. Gary has always been looking to do a better job for his students. His students in turn, wanted to achieve and to work hard for him. It is not surprising that Gary leaves having gained an outstanding set of regular scholarship results that is the envy of almost every curriculum area of the school (including Duncan's Science department). Results such as the eight Mathematics with Statistics achieved by the cohort in 2011 - two of which were Outstanding, were not viewed as unusual. Whether you were a struggling 'C streamer' or one of the school's most able mathematicians, you always knew that 'Mr J' would willingly give time and attention, to patiently support you if you had a problem.

Gary is a gentleman in the true sense of the word. A person of equable temperament, Gary has proved irrepressibly an individual with a positive, upbeat demeanour, always ready for a chat or a friendly word of encouragement. A great member of the common room, who had the capacity to lift the mood of others by his own great approach to life.

St Paul's this year loses a likeable, jovial personality in our school community. An individual who made a valuable contribution to co-curricular activities and who was a great practitioner in the classroom. We thank Gary for his professionalism and dedicated response to his duties at our school and wish Gary and Gerri quality time with Joshua, David and Timothy and their families in San Francisco and Wellington. Thanks once again for all you have done for us as individuals and as an educational institution.



# NEW APPOINTMENT TO STAFF – DIRECTOR OF SPORTS DEVELOPMENT



We recently introduced a new staffing position within the School that is designed to ensure that the development of all of our sporting codes have oversight to maximise the outcomes for all major sports played within our School through the use of 'best practice' and to give the Sporting Cornerstone the prominence it deserves, seeming as it is St Paul's policy that all students, from the time they join us, are involved in both a summer and winter sport. We have appointed an extremely knowledgeable and highly-skilled individual, who has an extensive background in both secondary school sport and is also an able practitioner – Mr Josh Hay. Mr Hay has previously spent 13 years (i.e. 2002 to 2015) at Hamilton Boys' High School holding a variety of positions including senior teacher, hostel master (three years), Year level Dean (five years) and Director of Sport (two years). He then took a break of two years to take on the role of Account Manager for The Lion Foundation, before being drawn back into an area for which he is immensely passionate – secondary school sports. Mr Hay has a Bachelor of Sport and Exercise Science (Coaching and Sport Psychology) from the Waikato Institute of Technology, where he later lectured in Level One Sport Psychology and Coaching and managed the Diploma in Personal Training. His teaching subjects include Physical Education, Outdoor Education, Health and Social Studies. We welcome Mr Hay and have no doubt that he will bring another dimension to the development of sports at St Paul's Collegiate School.

### **U15 NATIONAL SEVENS**

The U15 Youthtown Condor Sevens National tournament was held at Sacred Heart College in Auckland from Thursday, 30th November through to Sunday, 3rd December 2017.

In the end, we played well for the smallest team in the tournament and came away with a solid first up placing at 15th overall and plenty to work on going forward. The opening day saw all the schools play two T20 matches each. For St Paul's, these were against Hutt International in the morning and Otago Boys' in the afternoon. Bowling first, we made a good start against Hutt International, with regular wickets falling. Despite conceding over 20 extras, we kept Hutt to only 99. In reply, we made light work of the total for an easy win. Next up were Otago Boys'. Otago have a strong side and we found things tough bowling first. Otago were going on nicely, but the dismissal of Jacob Cumming (son of former New Zealand cricketer Craig Cumming), lead to a minor collapse and we restricted them to only 121. # WAIKATO GET 2 GO TEAM ACHIEVE A FOURTH PLACING IN ANNUAL CHALLENGE

On 3rd December 2017, four St Paul's boys: Trey Lincoln, Sam Kalma, Oliver Larcombe and Ben Littlejohn were joined by four Waikato Diocesan girls: Arna Morris, Emma Barton, Elle Barton and Zeta Hitmann, to form a combined team, which travelled by van and ferry to Great Barrier Island for the annual Get 2 Go Challenge.

The six day long Get 2 Go challenge was contested by 12 teams from around New Zealand, who had each won their regional qualifiers and proved themselves to be amongst the toughest and fittest Year 9 and Year 10 adventure sport enthusiasts from throughout New Zealand.

The six day challenge included between five to eight hours daily of kayaking, raft racing, rock climbing, off road trail running, swimming, high rope climbing, orienteering, rogaine and sailing. Many of the challenges also relied hugely on teamwork, problem solving skills and strategy. For example, teams were required to cook pancakes blindfolded, use random materials to build bridges over water, strategize over orienteering courses and consider and compensate for, the various strengths and weaknesses of their team.

Throughout the duration, the team stuck together brilliantly and threw themselves into every challenge. In the end the combined Dio/St Paul's team finished in their best ever position in the Get 2 Go finals of 4th out of 12 teams nationally. The three teams who finished ahead of them were all made up of athletes for whom adventure sport is their chosen pursuit, whereas for our team, they play a variety of sports.

Trey Lincoln was recognised for his leadership and navigation skills with the team's "Instructors Award", while Arna Morris (who joins St Paul's in 2018) did brilliantly to make the eight person tournament "dream team" for her grit and "pack horse" ability.

Well done to all the competitors and also to those students who trained with and pushed the final team chosen for the finals to be the best they could be. Thank you to Mr Garth Littlejohn who travelled with the group, in place of Mr Keegan Stewart who was overseas at the time.

### NZ TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPS 2017

A small team of four athletes headed to Hastings directly after prize giving to compete in the NZ Secondary Schools Athletics Championships. They competed over three days of cloudless skies and hot temperatures.

While no podium places were achieved this year, the students performed with distinction.

Year 9 student, Sitiveni Lose ran strongly to place fourth in the junior boys 100m hurdles, in a personal best time of 15.45s. He also gained another personal best in the high jump,

clearing 1.70m and finishing ninth. Sitiveni will be one to watch in the future.

James Mitchell threw a personal best throw of 50.50m to place seventh in the senior boys' javelin.

Madison Tims equalled her best high jump, clearing 1.50m and placing eighth in the senior girls, while Lane Tims cleared 1.75m to finish tenth in the senior boys.

# FINAL TWO POU IN PLACE AT GATEWAY TO THE STUDENT CENTRE

At a special blessing ceremony held on Thursday, 23rd November 2017, the final two Pou were unveiled in the garden in front of the Student Centre at St Paul's Collegiate School. This three piece carved art work encapsulates the values and aspirations of St Paul's Collegiate School. It is a visual representation to the interconnected cultures, beliefs and values in the School's strong character and tradition. It also refers to the influences of the past, present, and future, which guide students to become meaningful contributors to society.

Master Carver (tohunga whakairo), Mr Michael Matchitt, descends from a line of carvers from Te Whānanu-ā-Apanui of the East Coast. Michael graduated with honours from Te Puia (the NZ Māori Arts and Crafts Institute) in 1988.

The 2014 school leavers, St Paul's Parents' Association and the Old Collegians' Association have generously donated to enable this three piece carved installation to sit proudly in our school grounds and for this, we as a School are extremely grateful.

The following is the story told by the Pou:

### WAKA MAUMAHARA – TE TAUIHU

The Tauihu is the prow of a waka (canoe). It leads the way, guiding the waka into the future. Representing Saint Paul, this piece acknowledges the significance of Christianity in the culture of the School.

### About the Design:

Front: The abstract figure of Saint Paul has a halo behind his head and a korowai around his shoulder to acknowledge his mana (prestige and authority). Below this is a crucifix outlined by kōwhaiwhai designs which represent the whakapapa

(genealogy) of Christianity.

Back: Surface patterning in the form of a number of traditional patterns. These represent the Christian values of the School.

### WAKA MAUMAHARA – TE TAURAPA

The Taurapa is the stern post of a waka. It provides stability, a sense of place, and houses the mauri (life force) and other treasured taonga.

Representing the tangata whenua of the region, this piece recognises the mana of local iwi (Ngāti Wairere, Waikato-Tainui) as well as the parallels between Māori and Christian values.

### About the Design:

Front: This abstract human figure represents local iwi (Ngāti Wairere, Waikato-Tainui). Below this is kōwhaiwhai patterning which acknowledges their whakapapa from Pre-European times to the present day.

Back: Surface patterning in the form of a number of traditional patterns. These are similar to those on the Tauihu, acknowledging that many values are shared between Māori and Christians alike. These values then extend to be inclusive of all cultures represented at the School.

### TIKI WĀNANGA - FIGURE

A tiki is an abstract human form. A wānanga is a place of learning. This Tiki Wānanga is a manifestation of the skills, knowledge, and values that students develop while at the School. It acknowledges the concepts of past, present, and future – we look to the learning of the past to guide us into the



future, while remaining firmly grounded in the present.

### About the Design:

Top: A fully three-dimensional abstract figure (Tekoteko). This represents those who pass through St Paul's. It represents the individual, the embodiment of a St Paul's graduate. It holds a toki poutangata — an adze, a symbol of leadership, to begin

endeavours and to clear the way ahead.

Bottom: The pole on which the Tekoteko stands has a woven pattern carved into it. This represents the act of binding together the many values, characteristics and learning that students acquire both at St Paul's and in their life.

# 2016 LEAVERS' GIFT COMPLETED BY ARTIST AND OLD COLLEGIAN, OWEN DIPPIE

The 2016 Leavers' Gift is a Mural of Sir Edmund Hillary painted using spray cans by renowned artist and Old Collegian (Clark House 1997-2001), Owen Dippie.

Just as Sir Edmund Hillary conquered Mt Everest in 1953, St Paul's Collegiate School encourages every student during their time here, to challenge themselves to reach their full potential – to turn possibilities into reality. St Paul's aims to develop independent and resourceful young adults who have the confidence to challenge themselves against the best in their chosen area. This in turn prepares them for life beyond their school years.

Owen Dippie has been practising art for as long as he can remember and producing street art for more than a decade. He's known around the world for his large-scale realist portraitures and, more recently, for his exploration of well-known Renaissance pieces combined with contemporary pop art.

He is one of the only street artists in the world who can produce large-scale art by hand without a projector.

His paintings scale tall buildings and his art equipment is made up of the usual paint and the not so usual cranes, ladders and safety harnesses.

In 2015, his career reached a high when he was recognised internationally for his work. He won the enviable Brooklyn Street Art Competition for his 'Ninja Renaissance Maters' piece and the Huffington Post named his piece 'The Radiant Madonna' as best mural 2015.

This mural of Sir Edmund Hillary was kindly donated by the 2016 school leavers' and their families and while, due to the terrible weather conditions throughout the year and the need to work around Owen's other artistic commitments, it has taken longer than expected to complete, but all agree, that it has been more than worth the wait! It is a stunning addition to the St Paul's skyline and we are delighted to have this inspirational piece of art to enjoy.





# 2017 LEAVERS' GIFT UNVEILED AT LEAVERS' DINNER

The 2017 Leavers' gift is a beautiful artwork painted by artist and Old Collegian (Hall House 1998 – 2002), Sam Mathers.

Sam grew up in Raglan and is a keen surfer. He has travelled and lived all over the world, working as a fulltime artist. He has been exhibiting work since 2004. Sam was commissioned by Saatchi & Saatchi to paint a mural in their Parnell offices, and later went on to paint a mural for the Media Design School in Auckland, which led to another commissioned mural in San Diego in 2012, for the New School of Architecture and Design
